

Jazz Vespers: Building Worship Around the Music

A Practical Approach to Thematic, Music-Led Evening Worship Services

What is Jazz Vespers?

Jazz Vespers is an evening worship format where music is central—not supplementary. Instead of selecting songs to support a sermon or scripture passage, this model builds the service around the music. Each service begins with a discerned theme, often drawn from the life of the congregation, and the rest of the liturgy is crafted in response to the music's emotional and theological trajectory.

This approach allows the music to do the work of both formation and proclamation, often opening up deeper engagement with scripture and community through improvisation, silence, and personal storytelling.

Why This Model Works

- ❖ Theological depth: Jazz music's improvisational nature allows room for mystery, lament, joy, and nuance.
- ❖ Pedagogical potential: Jazz Vespers introduces congregants to musical forms, traditions, and stories they may not already know.
- ❖ Congregational formation: A theme-based structure teaches the congregation how to listen differently—to be present, contemplative, and connected.
- ❖ Flexibility: Especially effective in evening settings or special services, this format adapts to solo performers, small ensembles, or full jazz groups.

How to Build a Jazz Vespers Service

1. Start with a theme.
Choose a theological or emotional theme inspired by the needs, celebrations, or griefs within your congregation.
2. Select music first.
Curate a set of jazz-based pieces that reflect or explore that theme. Instrumental or lyrical arrangements work equally well.

Example:

- "Holy City" (as a response to grief and hope)
- "A Quiet Place" (inviting contemplation and stillness)
- "Christ is All" (a testimony of assurance)
- "Soon and Very Soon" (resurrection hope)

All selections above were arranged for use in Jazz Vespers and later recorded on The Book of Enoch, Vol. 1 (Enoch Smith Jr., Misfitme Music, 2025).

3. Build the rest of the service around the music.
Craft scripture readings, prayers, visuals, or moments of silence that respond to the arc of the music.
4. Offer short, thoughtful introductions.
Before each song, share a brief story about its origin, significance, or scriptural connection.
5. Allow for open reflection or response.
Include an opportunity for congregants to reflect aloud, write responses, or sit in silence.

Helpful Tools and Tips

- Live music is best. Improvisation is essential to this model.
- Less is more. Most Jazz Vespers services include 4–6 musical pieces and run 45–60 minutes.
- Use visual or tactile symbols to anchor the theme.
- Keep the space flexible—both physically and emotionally. The goal is not precision, but presence.
